

Indictment Statement of Kashi Branch of People's Procuratorate of Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region

(2009) Ka Jian Xing Su Zi No. 65

The defendant Alimujiang Yimiti is a 35-year-old male person of Uyghur ethnicity born on June 10, 1973. He completed a two-year college education and was the manager in the Kashi Branch of Jirehouse, a British company in foodstuff processing. He originally resided at Room 604, Building 3, No. 12, Shengli Road, Tianshan District, Urumqi. Before his arrest, he resided at Room 601, (8-2) Unit 1, Huicheng Residential Compound of Kashi. He had no previous criminal record.

On January 12, 2008, he was placed under criminal detention by Kashi Municipal Public Security Bureau on suspicion of endangering the state security. He was arrested in accordance with law on February 20, 2008.

The Public Security Bureau of Kashi District has completed the investigation on this case and believes that the defendant Alimujiang Yimiti is suspected of inciting secession of the state and illegally providing state secrets to foreigners. On April 2, 2008, his case was transferred to this court for review and indictment. After this court accepted it, it notified the defendant that he has the right to hire a defense counsel and it conducted an interrogation on the defendant in accordance with law and reviewed all the materials involved in the case.

After legal investigations, it is found that he has committed the crimes as follows:

After the defendant Alimujiang Yimiti had a talk of investigation with Kashi Municipal Bureau for Ethnic and Religious Affairs on April 16, 2007, he went to the Donghu residential compound of Mr. Gxxx, an American national, on the morning of April 20, 2007. There he reported to Mr. Gxxx how Kashi Municipal Bureau for Ethnic and Religious Affairs was investigating their efforts to develop Christians among people of Uyghur ethnicity.

He told Mr. Gxxx: "I've got into some troubles. On Monday, people from the Ethnic and Religious Affairs came to talk with us. I guess the State Security Bureau had told them our names. Four or five people from the Bureau for Ethnic and Religious Affairs came and they are all Uyghurs. They asked me some questions and talked with me for about two hours. They asked me whether we engaged in religious activities when we got together, why we call Jesus Huda (Allah in Uyghur language), what the word "trinity" means and from what sources we got these religious materials, etc."

When Mr. Gxxx heard this, he advised Alimujiang Yimiti: "In doing this kind of thing, you should do it in secret." In the meantime, Alimujiang Yimiti reported to Mr. Gxxx how a few people behaved who were investigated by the authorities and his own plans.

On the afternoon of May 16, 2007, the defendant Alimujiang Yimiti once again went to the residence of Mr. Gxxx where Mr. Gxxx told him in details how he was investigated and questioned by agencies in charge of ethnic and religious affairs and how his case was handled by

Foreign Affairs Office of the Public Security Bureau and Bureau for Industrial and Commercial Administration. After this, he believed: This thing started a long time ago. They have prepared this for a long time ago and there's no chance we can win." Alimujiang Yimiti told him: "We have always been soulmates with you. If you give up, what about the foreign employees? You can say all this is my personal behavior and has nothing to do with the company. You can't give up like this."

Mr. Gxxx showed great concern on Alimujiang Yimiti's investigation by our state security agencies. He reminded Alimujiang to be cautious by all means and said: "People from the State Security Bureau have come to look for you. You'd better be careful. The longer this lasts, the worse it'll be to you. In that case, we'll worry about you more."

The evidence with which the confirmation of the above facts was made is:

Testimonies from witnesses, written records from the search and evaluation statement from the Administration for the Protection of State Secrets of the autonomous region.

This court holds this following opinion:

The defendant Alimujiang Yimiti's conduct of passing information to foreigners on the law enforcement by the state agencies hampered the otherwise normal activities of the state agencies. His conduct has caused serious consequences and has brought a vicious influence. His conduct has constituted the crime of illegally providing state secrets to foreigners as specified in Article 111 of the "Criminal Law of the People's Republic of China."

The facts in this case are clear and the evidence thereof is accurate. The defendant Alimujiang Yimiti should be held responsible for illegally providing state states to foreigners. Therefore, pursuant to Article 141 of the "Criminal Procedural Law of the People's Republic of China," we hereby bring this indictment at this court and please give your penalties in accordance with law.
